Esteemed host,
perhaps you have grated yam soup ...

(“Mariko-shuku” in “Tokaidochu Hizakurige {A Shank’s Mare Tour of the Tokaido}”)



In the teahouse depicted in the ukiyo-e, you can see travelers eating it with gusto, and a person has come to sell Japanese yam.

In 1691, poet Matsuo Basho wrote about the Mariko-shuku: “Japanese apricots, young greens, and the grated yam soup of the Mariko-shuku.”

The Mariko-shuku is the 20th of the Tokaido and is situated in a small mountain valley. Because high-quality Japanese yam was harvested there, grated yam soup was offered to travelers as a meal.

Speaking of grated yam soup, it became the subject of the “Tokaidochu Hizakurige” by Jippensha Ikku, published in 1802, and also the subject of Utagawa Hiroshige’s ukiyo-e, painted in 1832.

Even today, grated yam soup is a specialty of the Mariko-shuku.

Mariko Castle overlooking the Mariko-shuku.
Imagawa Castle was transformed into a full-fledged castle by Takeda Shingen and later into a castle to defend Fuchu by Tokugawa Ieyasu.

Highlights of the Mariko-shuku, the Tokaido

The Mariko-shuku is located between the Utsunoya Pass in the west and the Abe River in the east.

It was a place where thoroughfares had passed since ancient times and many people came and went, so many stories have been passed down.



起樹天満宮 Okigi Tenman-gu Shrine

There is also a legend that the red-flowered Japanese apricot tree at the Okigi Tenman-gu Shrine, which had been blocking the way, got up overnight.



泉ヶ谷 Izumigaya area

In the Izumigaya area, temples and houses stand side by side, followed by the slope of the Kansho-in Temple.



吐月峰柴屋寺 Togeppo Saiokuji Temple

Renga poet Socho, who served the Imagawa clan in the Muromachi period. Zen temple where Socho spent the rest of his life.



日本の紅茶発祥の地 The birthplace of black tea in Japan
Tada Motokichi succeeded in cultivating black tea for the first time in Japan with cuttings brought from the Assam region in India.



誓願寺 Seiganji Temple

There is the grave of Katagiri Katsumoto in the Seiganji Temple. He was a retainer of the Toyotomi clan.



歆昌院 Kansho-in Temple

A temple quietly standing against the mountains, with statues of the five hundred disciples of the Buddha.














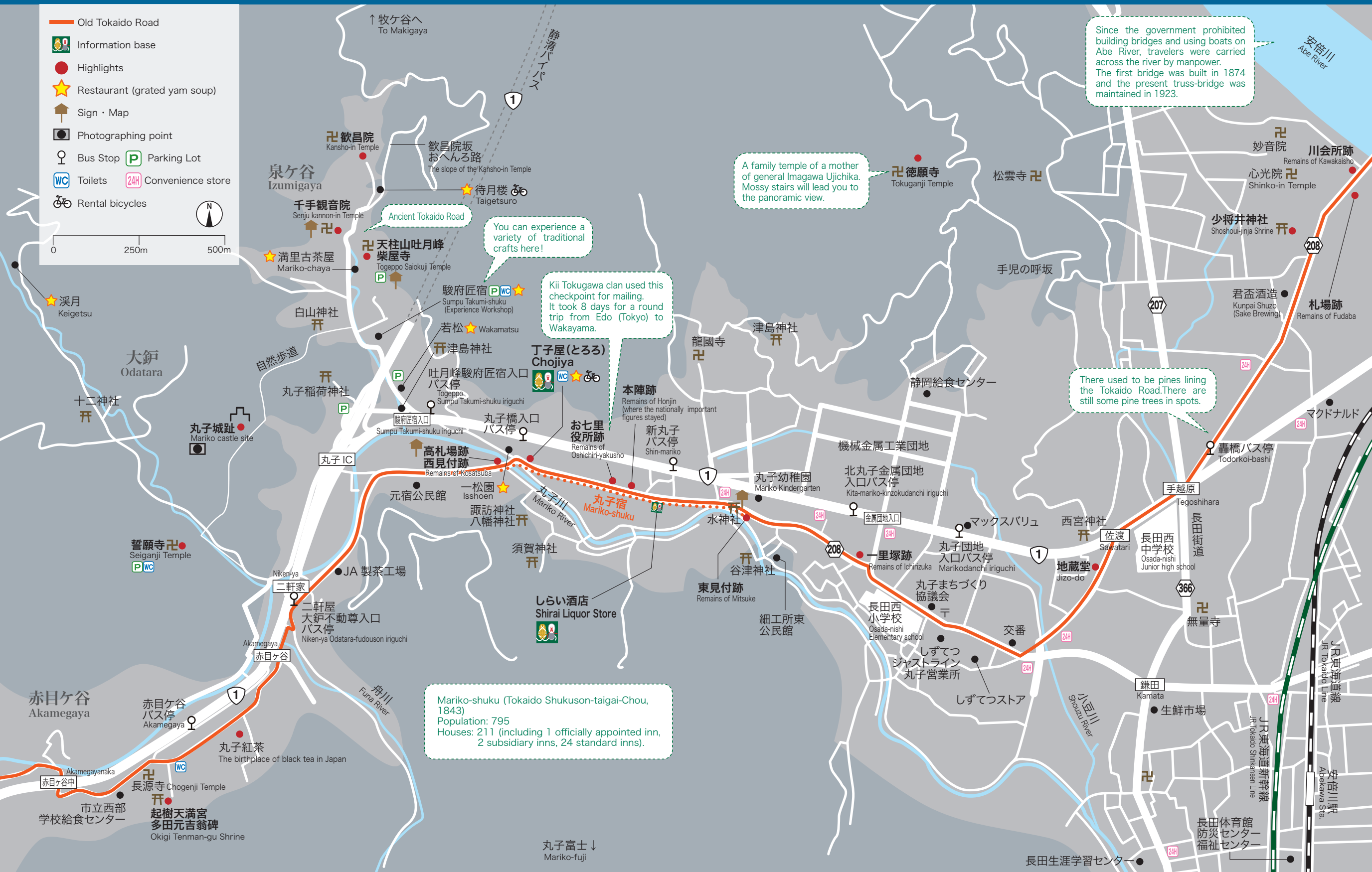
小将井神社 Shoshouji-jinja Shrine

Since the government prohibited building bridges and using boats on Abe River, travelers were carried across the river by manpower. The first bridge was built in 1874 and the present truss-bridge was maintained in 1923.

Kii Tokugawa clan used this checkpoint for mailing. It took 8 days for a round trip from Edo (Tokyo) to Wakayama.

There used to be pines lining the Tokaido Road. There are still some pine trees in spots.
